

DR. CAMERON WEBB, MD

Dr. B. Cameron Webb is a physician and lawyer who works at the intersection of health and social justice. He is an Assistant Professor of Medicine and Public Health Science at the University of Virginia, where he works as a hospitalist in the Department of Medicine and serves as co-director of the Department of Public Health Science's Health Policy Program. He recently completed a year as a 2016-17 White House Fellow. In his time spanning the Obama and Trump administrations, his portfolio included education, workforce and criminal justice reform work through President Obama's My Brother's Keeper initiative, as well as White House healthcare policy work in both administrations. Dr. Webb is a passionate champion for health equity and is committed to advocating for the health needs of underserved and marginalized communities. He has served on several non-profit board and is currently a member of the Board of Directors of Doctors for America. He received a B.A. in Interdisciplinary Studies as an Echols Scholar at the University of Virginia, a J.D. and health law certificate from Loyola University Chicago School of Law, and an M.D. from Wake Forest School of Medicine.





CHARLES W. MUSE

Charles Muse, currently serving on General Motors Program
Engineering Management Team for Autonomous Vehicles, has
over 8 years of automotive industry experience. His professional
background includes roles as a Lead Aerodynamicist, Chassis
Senior Design Release Engineer, and Engineering Operations

University Aerospace Engineering graduate, and licensed private

DR. COLIN TOPPER CAREW

Dr. Carew was born and raised in Boston. He attended Howard University's Architectural School and earned a Bachelor of Architecture and a Master's Degree in Environmental Design from Yale University and a Doctorate from the Union Graduate School/Institute of Policy Studies.

Carew transitioned from Architecture to Media. He has received innumerable awards as a film and television writer, producer, director, and as a designer. In Media, he has produced content for PBS, HBO, Showtime, Nick and The Disney Channel. Other of his projects have aired in national prime time on ABC, NBC, BET, FOX, TNT, TV One, and MTV. His theatrically released films include DC Cab (Universal Pictures) and Breakin' and Enterin' (Shapiro/Glickenhaus). One of Topper's most notable media achievements is as the Co-Creator and Executive Producer of the "Martin" television series.

Presently, he is Principal Investigator and Research Scientist at the MIT Media Lab. Carew directs the Code Next Project and the HBCU initiative. As Code Next's founder, he has established an Innovation Lab at the Google headquarters in NYC and in Oakland.





D. KEVIN McNEIR

D. Kevin McNeir is an award-winning journalist with 25 years of service with the Black Press in cities that include Chicago, Atlanta and Miami. He currently serves as the editor for The Washington Informer where just weeks ago, he and his team garnered five unprecedented first place awards for journalism and photography from the Society of Professional Journalists DC Chapter. A Detroit native, he began his career as a copy editor and reporter with the Michigan Chronicle after completing degrees at the Univ. of Michigan, Emory and Princeton Theological Seminary.





DARLENE GOINS

Darlene Goins is senior vice president and head of financial health philanthropy for the Wells Fargo Foundation, one of the largest corporate foundations in the U.S. In 2019, the Wells Fargo Foundation donated \$455 million to unlock economic opportunity for people and communities by addressing housing affordability, small business growth, and financial health.

With more than two decades of experience leading strategic initiatives that drive business and societal impact, Goins is responsible for combining Wells Fargo's financial resources with business expertise to improve the financial well-being of underserved individuals, families, and communities. Prior to this role, Goins served as Wells Fargo's head of Hands on Banking®, the company's award-winning financial education and capability program that has benefitted more than 9 million youth, adults, seniors, military and entrepreneurs with financial education.

Goins joined Wells Fargo in 2016 from FICO, where she led FICO® Score Open Access, a consumer credit score program that earned allocates from the Obama Administration, regulators, and consumer advocacy groups, among others. She also held leadership positions in sales, product management, decision science, and data science at analytic-based software companies Nomis Solutions, First Data Corporation, and ALI Solutions.

An active community leader, Goins is based in San Francisco and currently serves on the board of directors for the American Bankers Association Foundation, Jump\$tart Coalition for Personal Financial Literacy and Asset Funders Network; and serves as Treasurer of the San Francisco Chapter of Jack and Jill of America, Inc.. She received a bachelor's of science degree in electrical engineering and a master's degree in Engineering-Economic Systems (now the Department of Management Science) from Stanford University.





DR. EBONY HILTON, MD

Dr. Ebony Jade Hilton Buchholz was born the middle of three girls in the rural town of Little Africa, South Carolina. Following a family tragedy, at the tender age of 8 years old, she told her mom she wanted to be a doctor. From that day forward her mother called her "Dr. Hilton." She attributes her entire career and the success that followed to that small gesture. She graduated from Spartanburg High School in 2000 and enrolled at the College of Charleston (CofC). In just 4 short years she graduated Magnum Cum Laude from CofC with 3 degrees: two Bachelor of Science degrees in Biochemistry and Molecular Biology, and a Bachelor of Arts in Inorganic Chemistry.

Ebony then began her medical studies at the Medical University of South Carolina (MUSC) and following graduation in 2008 she continued at this institution for completion of her Anesthesiology residency and Critical Care fellowship. On July 1, 2013 she became the 1st African-American female anesthesiologist to be hired at MUSC since its opening in 1824. In addition to pioneering medicine, Dr. Hilton is a children's book author of the Ava Series, she is a public speaker and a community activist.

STATE OF EMERGENCY DECLARED FOR BLACK AMERICA AS PUBLIC HEALTH EXPERTS REVEAL CORONAVIRUS IS AIRBORNE

While many medical doctors maintain that the novel coronavirus is transmitted through droplets from coughs or sneezes, more and more medical experts and officials who work primarily with infectious respiratory illnesses and aerosols are convinced that the disease is airborne.

Today, as a result of recent medical research and data, The National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) President and CEO, Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr. has issued a solemn national public warning and alert to nearly 50 million African Americans. "Black America is now in a state of emergency as a result of the disproportionately deadly impact of the coronavirus pandemic on our families and communities across the United States," Chavis stated. "The coronavirus is now airborne. That means that the coronavirus can be in air that we breath."

"Black Americans should stay at home and only leave home for critical life-essential reasons," Chavis emphasized. "In fact, all Americans should stay at home to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus pandemic. But I must emphasize that because before the spread of the coronavirus, Black Americans were already disproportionately burdened with multiple preexisting health conditions, including asthma, diabetes, and heart disease, our communities are more vulnerable to the impact of the coronavirus, including higher rates of fatalities."

A Pro Publica report revealed that African Americans made up almost half of Milwaukee County's 945 cases and 81 percent of its 27 deaths in a county whose population is only 26 percent Black.

Milwaukee is one of the few places in the United States that is tracking the racial breakdown of people who have been infected by the novel coronavirus, offering a glimpse at the disproportionate destruction it is inflicting on Black communities nationwide.

In Michigan, where the state's population is 14 percent Black, African Americans made up 35 percent of cases and 40 percent of deaths as of Friday, April 3.

Detroit, where a majority of residents are Black, has emerged as a hot spot with a high death toll. As has New Orleans, according to Pro Publica.

Louisiana has not published case breakdowns by race, but 40 percent of the state's deaths have happened in Orleans Parish, where the majority of residents are Black.

Illinois and North Carolina are two of the few areas publishing statistics on COVID-19 cases by race, and their data shows a disproportionate number of African Americans were infected, according to the report.

"We know in the US that there are great discrepancies in not only the diagnosis but the treatment that African Americans and other minorities are afforded," stated Dr. Ebony Hilton, associate professor of anesthesiology and critical care medicine at the University of Virginia Health Systems.

"So, I want to make sure that in this pandemic, that Black and brown people are treated in the same way and that these tests are made available in the same pattern as for white people," Dr. Hilton said.

Medical experts have also sounded the alarm that the virus could well be transmitted through the air.

"Currently available research supports the possibility that (COVID-19) could be spread via bioaerosols generated directly by patients' exhalation," Harvey Fineberg, who heads a standing committee on Emerging Infectious Diseases and 21st Century Health Threats, wrote in an April 1, 2020 letter to Kelvin Droegemeier, the head of the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy (OSTP).

"One must be cautious in imputing the findings with one respiratory virus to another respiratory virus, as each virus may have its own effective infectious inoculum and distinct aerosolization characteristics," Fineberg wrote.

"Studies that rely on PCR to detect the presence of viral RNA may not represent virus in sufficient amounts to produce infection. Nevertheless, the presence of viral RNA in air droplets and aerosols indicates the possibility of viral transmission via these routes."

Fineberg penned the letter in response to a request from the White House OSTP. The National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine convened a standing committee of experts to help inform OSTP on critical science and policy issues related to emerging infectious diseases and other public health threats.

The standing committee includes members with expertise in emerging infectious diseases, public health, public health preparedness and response, biological sciences, clinical care and crisis standards of care, risk communication, and regulatory issues.

"The results of available studies are consistent with aerosolization of virus from normal breathing," Fineberg wrote.

He noted an airflow modeling study that followed a coronavirus outbreak in Hong Kong in the early 2000s supports the potential for transmission via bioaerosols.

In that study, the significantly increased risk of infection to residents on higher floors of a building that was home to an infected individual indicated to the researchers a pattern of disease consistent with a rising plume of contaminated warm air.

"In the mind of scientists working on this, there's absolutely no doubt that the virus spreads in the air. This is a no-brainer." Lidia Morawska, at the Queensland University of Technology in Brisbane, Australia, told the medical website, nature.com.

A March 2020 Cambridge Research study of those with influenza revealed that 39 percent of individuals exhaled infectious aerosols, which experts noted that, as long as an airspace is shared with someone else, breathing in the air they exhale, it's possible for airborne transmission of the coronavirus.

"It's airborne," Dr. Angela Guerrera, an emergency medicine specialist in New Jersey, told NNPA Newswire.

"If someone has the disease, they don't have to cough and sneeze or spit. If you then go into their space, you can probably get it," Dr. Guerrera stated.

Some experts said they are convinced that a primary reason that governments and organizations like the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and the World Health Organization (WHO) have shied away from stating that the virus is in the air is to prevent panic and because it could take years and cost hundreds of millions of lives before indisputable evidence can be presented.

"We shouldn't let perfect be the enemy of convincing," Michael Osterholm, an infectious disease epidemiologist at the University of Minnesota, stated.

A spokeswoman for the WHO told NNPA Newswire that the organization is focused solely on treatment and trials.

"As far as treatment for COVID-19 is concerned, so far, we have no evidence that any particular drug is effective, but researchers around the world are working hard on this. More than 20 vaccines are in development globally, and several therapeutics are in clinical trials," stated WHO spokeswoman Ashley Baldwin.

Congressman John Lewis Endorses Joe Biden for President

"I am very pleased and very happy to take the time to endorse a friend, a man of courage, and a man of conscious, as the Democratic nominee for president of the United States,"

Lewis said on a media call where major news outlets from around the country participated, including the Black Press of America. Legendary Congressman John Lewis (D-Ga.), one of America's foremost moral leaders whose work since the civil rights movement of the 1950s made him a national treasure, has formally endorsed former U.S. Vice President Joe Biden as the 2020 Democratic nominee for President of the United States of America.

The 80-year-old congressman who on March 7, 1965, was badly beaten as he helped to lead over 600 peaceful protestors across the Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, said that Biden was the person to lead the country back on the right side of history.

"I am very pleased and very happy to take the time to endorse a friend, a man of courage, and a man of conscience, as the Democratic nominee for president of the United States," Lewis said on a media call where major news outlets from around the country participated, including the Black Press of America.

"We need Joe Biden more than ever before," Lewis added.

The widely respected congressman said America needs Biden at the helm.

"He's a man of courage, great intelligence, and a man of faith," Lewis stated. "He will be a great president, and he will lead our country to a better place, and he will inspire another generation to stand up, to speak up, to speak out, to be brave and bold, and that's why I'm committed to supporting him."

When asked by NNPA President and CEO Dr. Benjamin F. Chavis, Jr., what is his vision of a Biden presidency, Lewis said the former U.S. Vice President would "be able to redeem the soul of America."

"It doesn't matter if you're white, Asian American, Latino, male, female, straight, or gay. We all live in the same house, the same boat," he continued.

"We must be able to live together as brother and sister, and Joe Biden will not be afraid to stand up and preach the way of love and preach the fact that we must respect the dignity and the worth of every human being. He can, and he will help us regain our was as a nation and as a people," Lewis exclaimed.

Born the son of sharecroppers on February 21, 1940, outside of Troy, Alabama, Lewis grew up on his family's farm and attended segregated public schools in Pike County, Alabama, according to his biography.

As a young boy, he was inspired by the activism surrounding the Montgomery Bus Boycott and the words of the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., which he heard on radio broadcasts. In those pivotal moments, he decided to become a part of the Civil Rights Movement. Ever since then, he has remained at the vanguard of progressive social movements and the human rights struggle in the United States.

"I grew up in rural Alabama, just miles from Montgomery in a town called Troy. Growing up there, I saw signs that said white men, colored men, white women, colored women, white waiting, colored waiting," Lewis reminisced.

"My grandparents said 'don't get in trouble, don't get in the way.' Then I heard a Rosa Parks. I listened to the voice and the words of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. The actions of Rosa Parks and Dr. King inspired me to get in what we called good trouble, necessary trouble."

Lewis pledged to rally younger African Americans to the polls.

"My message is simple. If you look around, you have a choice," Lewis stated. "You must decide to get out there and vote like we've never voted before. Young people, college students, and high school students old enough to vote, you must vote."

He concluded:

"I saw people arrested and beaten and jailed when attempting to register to vote. When we marched in Selma, more than 600 of us were beaten and jailed when we attempted to register. I gave a little blood on that bridge. I almost died. So, young people, just go out and vote and help elect a man of conscious, a man who will look out for each and every one of us and help build a society where no one will be left behind because of race color of skin and gender."


